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PERFORMANCE NOTES

In Luna Gale, which premiered in 2014 at Chicago's Goodman Theatre, award-winning playwright Rebecca Gilman takes us into the world of Caroline, an lowa social worker who is overwhelmed by an impossibly large case load created by ongoing budget cuts to the state's Department of Human Services, who nonetheless continues to try to do what's best for her clients. The play shines a light on the challenges faced by an underfunded social welfare system, stressed to the limits, as it copes with its mission of taking care of vulnerable children. More than 400,000 children are in foster care at any given time in the United States, while more than 250,000 children enter the system every year, with only about half of them being reunited with their parents or primary care-givers. (Statistics from Children's Rights, an advocacy organization, as cited in Goodman Theatre's study guide for "Luna Gale," 2014)

Gilman has never shied away from controversial subjects, having addressed stalking ("Boy Gets Girl"), campus racism ("Spinning into Butter"), child abuse, sexual deviance, and serial murder ("The Glory of Living") in previous plays. The dramatist is "one of America's most talked-about and sought-after playwrights. Theaters are fighting for the rights to do her plays," said American Theatre magazine, and "Luna Gale" was called "one of the year's most valuable additions to American drama" by the Los Angeles Times.

Per Children's Home Society and Lutheran Social Service of Minnesota:

- 70% of foster kids would like to go to college, but only 3% of kids who
 age out of the system will earn a college degree, and one in four won't
 graduate from high school or get a GED.
- 7 out of 10 girls who age out of the system will become pregnant by the age of 21.
- 1 in 2 kids who age out of the system will develop a substance dependence.
- 32% of children who reached age 18 in foster care were waiting in the system for more than three years.

Per Child Crisis Arizona:

 Among children who age out of the foster care system, 1 in 5 will be homeless within one year, and 1 in 4 will be incarcerated within two years.

Per Darkness to Light, an organization dedicated to ending child sexual abuse:

- About 1 in 7 girls and 1 in 25 boys will be sexually abused, including contact abuse, before they turn 18.
- 60% of child sexual abuse victims never tell anyone.

ABOUT THE PLAYWRIGHT

Rebecca Gilman's plays include "Luna Gale"; "Spinning Into Butter"; "Boy Gets Girl"; "The Crowd You're in With"; "Dollhouse"; "A True History of the Johnstown Flood"; "The Heart Is a Lonely Hunter"; "Blue Surge"; "Soups, Stews, and Casseroles:" "1976" and "The Glory of Living." Her plays have been produced by (among others) the Goodman Theatre, Steppenwolf Theatre, the Royal Court Theatre, Lincoln Center Theater, the Public Theater, Manhattan Theatre Club, New York Theatre Workshop and Manhattan Class Company. Gilman is the recipient of a Guggenheim Fellowship, the Roger L. Stevens Award from the Kennedy Center Fund for New American Plays, the Evening Standard Award for Most Promising Playwright, the George Devine Award and the Harper Lee Award. She was named a finalist for the 2001 Pulitzer Prize for her play "The Glory of Living." Gilman is an artistic associate at the Goodman Theatre. She is an associate professor of dramatic writing at Northwestern University.

Zigler is a founding member, past artistic director and senior acting faculty at the Atlantic Theatre Company. He was the Director of the American Repertory Theater / Moscow Art Theatre School Institute for Advanced Theater Training at Harvard University, and in 2017, became the Dean of the School of Drama at the University of North Carolina School of the Arts where he has directed "next to normal" and "The Fairy Tale Lives of Russian Girls and Other Fantastical Tales." He is a co-author of the book, "A Practical Handbook for the Actor."
