BIOGRAPHIES

MARIA SERKIN is the assistant professor of horn at UNC School of the Arts (UNCSA). Previously, she taught at the University of Virginia and New World School of the Arts, held principal horn positions with the Florida Grand Opera, Palm Beach Symphony and the Sarasota Orchestra, and she was a fellow with the New World Symphony. Serkin earned undergraduate and graduate degrees from the Eastman School of Music and New England Conservatory, and a doctorate of musical arts from the Manhattan School of Music. Recent performance highlights include extensive work with the Hawaii Performing Arts Festival, Palm Beach Chamber Music Festival, Palm Beach Opera and the North Carolina Symphony.

DREW BANZHOFF (first-year undergraduate student) is a composer and conductor hailing from Black Mountain, North Carolina. His music covers a wide range of genres and styles, and he frequently writes for many different ensembles including orchestra, wind ensemble, choir, chamber music, big band, musical theater and electronic music. In addition to composing, he is also a multi-instrumentalist and has frequently performed piano, organ, trombone, tuba, percussion and voice. He is currently an undergraduate student at UNCSA studying composition under Lawrence Dillon.

BRUCE BREWSTER (first-year graduate student) enjoys performing with UNCSA's large ensembles and the Chrysalis Brass Quintet. He has been a horn instructor at UNCSA's Community Music School and Separk Music. Recent professional highlights include work with the Piedmont Wind Symphony and the Lexington Youth Theater.

LILIANA CARREIRO (high school junior) is a member of UNCSA's high school brass quintet, orchestra and wind ensemble. She will attend Cannon Music Camp this summer at Appalachian State University.

MONET JOWERS (high school senior) is a member of a student wind quintet in addition to UNCSA's large ensembles. Recently, she was named the winner of the Music Teachers National Association Southern Division Senior Brass Competition and a winner of the Winston-Salem Symphony Youth Orchestra Concerto Competition.

Smith serves as the materials officer for Grace Notes. Additionally, she is a member of ArtistCorps and a brass repair technician for Separk Music.
