BIOGRAPHIES

ANDREW HARRIS is an up-and-coming composer from North Carolina. With a musical viewpoint of "epic programmaticism," Harris seeks to combine the aesthetics of orchestral film music with more standard instrumental performance groups. From writing about the ferocity of nature to the journey of an inner peace, Harris uses his music to tell stories both concrete and abstract. Harris is currently pursuing a graduate degree in music composition at the UNC School of the Arts (UNCSA) and is in the studio of Lawrence Dillon. His "October Nights" was premiered by the UNCSA faculty ensemble Watson Brass in January 2020.

GUSTAV EDWARD KNUDSON is a third-year composition student in the UNCSA School of Music and studies with Kenneth Frazelle. He is originally from the Chicago, Illinois area, but currently lives in Gainesville, Florida. Knudson was drawn to music at an early age, being able to pick out and learn melodies on the piano. He began his musical career in middle school when he joined the band program and began composing in the winter of 2014. Knudson draws his musical inspiration from the works of Igor Stravinsky, Aaron Copland and Percy Aldridge Grainger, as well as from poetry and nature. This past year, Knudson was privileged to have his music recorded by the Akropolis Reed Quintet and the Verona String Quartet.

K. C. PYLE is a composer/multi-instrumentalist and is a Winston-Salem native. He draws inspiration from the folk music traditions and landscapes of the Appalachian foothills, and he is influenced by musical traditions from around the globe. He describes his music as post-minimalist, marked with rhythmic freedom and melodically informed by his study of world music. This season, Pyle has had recording sessions with Eighth Blackbird, the Akropolis Reed Quintet and the Verona String Quartet. He is an avid banjo player. He also performs with and composes for Gamelan Girl Murti, a Balinese gamelan ensemble at Wake Forest University. Pyle is a student of Lawrence Dillon.

MARK A. NORMAN is the director of wind ensembles and resident conductor at UNCSA. Norman teaches instrumental conducting and directs the Wind Ensemble and Chamber Winds as well as select performances with the Symphony Orchestra and the nu Ensemble. Outside of his duties at UNCSA, he is the music director for the American Music Ensemble, a professional consort comprised of UNCSA alumni and faculty specializing in the 19th- and 20th-century music of Scott Joplin, John Phillip Sousa and early jazz composers. Recently, he was named the conductor of the Winston-Salem Youth Symphony Orchestra. Norman is a former tuba instrumentalist with the U.S. Navy Band in Washington, D.C., and principal tuba of the Georgetown, McLean and Mt. Vernon symphonies. He has performed with the North Carolina, Charlotte, Richmond, Fairfax, Winston-Salem, Greensboro and Topeka symphony orchestras and is the winner of several solo and chamber music competitions. Previously, he served on the conducting faculty at UNC-Greensboro, University of Michigan, University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, Washburn and Towson universities. Norman is the owner of the Charlotte Music School and serves as the board chair for the North Carolina Brass Band.
