BIOGRAPHIES

STERLING D. TILLEY, III, a native of Springfield, VA, began his musical journey as a preschooler, quickly playing tunes by ear. At seven years old, he began formally studying the piano. Within the initial few weeks of lessons, he composed his first piece, "Bats in the Graveyard." From that moment on, Tilley knew that he wanted to be a composer. He is an accomplished pianist who has performed in numerous competitions, theater productions and religious services. His most recognized composition, "The Rise of Black Diamond," was featured during the awards ceremony for the 2020 National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) national Afro-Academic, Cultural, Technological and Scientific Olympics (ACT-SO) Competition. Tilley continues to compose music as a college sophomore at the University of North Carolina School of the Arts (UNCSA) studying with Lawrence Dillon.

DAVID DASH joined the UNCSA music faculty in 2017. He is acting associate principal trumpet of the North Carolina Symphony and a member of the Grammy-Award winning Santa Fe Opera. Previous to his UNCSA appointment, he was assistant principal trumpet of the Naples Philharmonic and a member of "The President's Own" United States Marine Band, where he performed as a soloist and toured much of the United States. He has also performed with the symphonies of Baltimore, Atlanta, Charlotte and San Francisco and the Los Angeles Philharmonic. Dash is a Yamaha Artist and a graduate of Rice University and the Manhattan School of Music.

Classical trumpeter MARY ELIZABETH BOWDEN has built a rapidly ascendant career as a soloist, praised for her "splendid, brilliant" playing (Gramophone Magazine) and the clarity, purity and power of her sound. A Gold Medal Global Music Award Winner, Opus Klassik Nominee and Yamaha Performing Artist, she has also worked to establish a new repertoire for the trumpet through creative, collaborative commissioning projects and award-winning albums. Her upcoming season includes performances of the Fung concerto with the Santa Fe Symphony,

Chicago Youth Symphony Orchestra, Shenandoah Conservatory Orchestra and San Diego State University Orchestra. Mexican composer Gina Enríquez Morán has been engaged to write a concerto for Bowden to be premiered by the World and European Brass Association. She is slated to perform Ellen Taaffe Zwilich's American Concerto with the Las Vegas Philharmonic in 2023, and she will make her debut in Turkey, performing with the Izmir State Symphonic Orchestra. Bowden will also embark on a five week tour with the Kassia Ensemble, performing a program of trumpet and string quartet arrangements featuring both core classical and contemporary works.

MARIA SERKIN is an active performer and pedagogue. Currently, Serkin is the assistant professor of horn at UNCSA. Previously, she was the lecturer of horn at the University of Virginia and the principal horn of the Charlottesville Symphony. She has also held the positions of principal horn with the Florida Grand Opera, Palm Beach Symphony and the Sarasota Orchestra, horn professor of the New World School of the Arts. In addition, she was a fellow with the New World Symphony in Miami Beach.

Serkin earned undergraduate and graduate degrees from the Eastman School of Music and New England Conservatory, and a Doctorate of Musical Arts degree from the Manhattan School of Music. During her studies, she performed with the Boston Symphony Orchestra, Kansas City Symphony, Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra, Spoleto Festival USA, National Repertory Orchestra, Pacific Music Festival and Boston Early Music Festival, and she was a fellow at the Tanglewood Music Center. She has also worked extensively with the North Carolina Brass Band, Palm Beach Chamber Music Festival, Palm Beach Opera, Naples Philharmonic Orchestra, Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra, Richmond Symphony Orchestra and the Virginia Sinfonietta. Her New York and Miami recording credits include work with The Public Theater's Shakespeare in the Park, Gloria Estefan and ESPN. Recent solo appearances include performances with the UNCSA Wind Ensemble and the Eastman Horn Choir.

An avid educator, Serkin has taught horn master classes extending from the Eastman School of Music and The Juilliard School to the Crescendo Summer Institute in Hungary. Her doctoral research established a progressive method of transposition, a first in the advancement of horn methodology.

Coming from a combined background as an accomplished freelancer in and around Philadelphia for 15 years and as a principal trombone of a major symphony orchestra since 2001, UNCSA trombone faculty **JOHN ILIKA** has much experience in both musical worlds. Drawing upon his diverse professional experience, including serving as a regular substitute with the Philadelphia Orchestra since 1989, Ilika guides his students to a variety of career opportunities, ranging from orchestral to commercial to free-lance.

Ilika has served as principal trombone with the North Carolina Symphony since January 2001. Other principal positions held include Pennsylvania Ballet, Delaware Symphony, Opera Delaware, Florida Music Festival, Maracaibo Symphony in Venezuela (assistant principal and bass trombone) and Philadelphia Brass (quintet). Joining the UNCSA faculty in 2010, previous teaching positions have included Eastern Music Festival, Lehigh University, Moravian College, Community College of Philadelphia, West Chester University (PA), University of Delaware and the Orquestra Juvenil in Caracas and Coro, Venezuela.

BRENT HARVEY teaches tuba and euphonium in the UNCSA School of Music and in the Community Music School. He has also served as associate professor of low brass at Winston-Salem State University since 2011. Harvey has performed with the Minnesota Orchestra, the National Wind Ensemble in Carnegie Hall, the Catania International Festival Orchestra in Italy, the Fountain City Brass Band in the United Kingdom and Western Europe, the Pine Mountain Music Festival Orchestra, the Charleston and Long Bay Symphony orchestras and in North Carolina with the Greensboro, Winston-Salem and Fayetteville Symphony orchestras.

He has appeared on National Public Radio and Minnesota Public Radio broadcasts with the Minnesota Orchestra. He actively performs with the Tubas In The Sun tuba quartet, Piedmont Polka Practitioners, Ardmore Brass Quintet, and he holds the principal B-flat bass chair in the North Carolina Brass Band, among others.
