OCTAVIO SOLIS (PLAYWRIGHT)

Octavio Solis is a playwright and director whose works "Mother Road," "Quixote Nuevo," "Hole in the Sky," "Alicia's Miracle," "Se Llama Cristina," John Steinbeck's "The Pastures of Heaven," "Ghosts of the River," "Quixote," "Lydia," "June in a Box," "Lethe," "Marfa Lights," "Gibraltar," "The Ballad of Pancho and Lucy," "The 7 Visions of Encarnación," "Bethlehem," "Dreamlandia," "El Otro," "Man of the Flesh," "Prospect," "El Paso Blue," "Santos & Santos" and "La Posada Mágica" have been mounted at the California Shakespeare Theatre, Mark Taper Forum, Yale Repertory Theatre, the Oregon Shakespeare Festival, the Denver Center for the Performing Arts, the Dallas Theater Center, the Magic Theatre, Intersection for the Arts, South Coast Repertory Theatre, the San Diego Repertory Theatre, the San Jose Repertory Theatre, Shadowlight Productions, the Venture Theatre in Philadelphia, Latino Chicago Theatre Company, Boston Court and Kitchen Dog Theatre, the New York Summer Play Festival, Teatro Vista in Chicago, El Teatro Campesino, the Undermain Theatre in Dallas, Thick Description, Campo Santo, the Imua Theatre Company in New York and Cornerstone Theatre.

His collaborative works include "Cloudlands," with music by Adam Gwon; "Burning Dreams," cowritten with Julie Hebert and Gina Leishman; and "Shiner," written with Erik Ehn. Solis has received an National Education Association (NEA) 1995-97 Playwriting Fellowship, the Roger L. Stevens Award from the Kennedy Center, the Will Glickman Playwright Award, a production grant from the Kennedy Center Fund for New American Plays, the 1998 Theatre Communications Group/National Education Association (TCG/NEA) Theatre Artists in Residence Grant, the 1998 McKnight Fellowship grant from the Playwrights Center in Minneapolis, and the National Latino Playwriting Award for 2003.

Solis is the recipient of the 2000-2001 National Theatre Artists Residency Grant from TCG and the Pew Charitable Trust, the United States Artists Fellowship for 2011 and the 2104 Pen Center USA Award for Drama. Solis is also a Thornton Wilder Fellow for the MacDowell Colony, New Dramatists alum and member of the Dramatists Guild. He is working on commissions for the Arena Stage, San Fransisco Playhouse and South Coast Repertory Theatre.

BIOGRAPHIES

QUIN GORDON (DIRECTOR)

Quin Gordon is an associate professor in the School of Drama at University of North Carolina School of the Arts (UNCSA) where he teaches acting and directing. He also serves as the director of recruitment for the school helping to identify the next class of gifted students. He was previously based in New York City working as a freelance director.

He is a graduate of The New Actors Workshop where he trained under Mike Nichols, Paul Sills and George Morrison. He received his his B.F.A. in directing from UNCSA and his M.F.A. in directing from University of North Carolina at Greensboro.

At UNCSA, he recently directed Peter Shaffer's "Amadeus" with an orchestra of 20 musicians onstage, Roy Williams' adaptation of "The Loneliness of the Long-Distance Runner," Lynn Nottage's "Sweat," Peter Parnell's two-part adaptation of the John Irving novel "The Cider House Rules," Lanford Wilson's "Balm in Gilead," Will Eno's "Middletown," Stephen Adley Guirgis' "The Last Days of Judas Iscariot," Vaclav Havel's "The Memorandum" and C. P. Taylor's "Good" with an orchestra of 20 musicians onstage.
