- ❖ End of the UDCIP report was put into place 5 years ago and we have put out the final report for this 5-year goal
 - This data will be published We exceeded our graduation rate goals
 - Aiming for 85% graduation rates which will be best captured through retention
 - Dance goal graduation grew from 67.9 but is a significant increased graduation rate
 - Music retention rates is an area of growth opportunity to serve the unique needs of the school of music
 - Music competition is fierce and is funded very well at other schools, so
 students have lots of choices and often lots of opportunity for scholarships
- UNC System Institutional Stretch goals are at
 - 4-year graduation rate
 - already at 77.3%; stretch goal of 78.91%
 - Undergraduate degree efficiency defined as an institution's number of undergraduate credentials awarded per 100 Full-Time Equivalent (FTE undergraduates
 - **22.6** to 24.09
 - Education and related expenses per degree
 - Stretch goal to reduce by 8.77%
 - Average cumulative debt at completion
 - Stretch goal to reduce by 13.5%
 - UNCSA-specific goal: 4-year graduation rate for Pell grant recipients
 - already at 73.17%; stretch goal of 74.7%

Holistic Student Development

The Division of Student Affairs facilitates the holistic development of students academically, artistically, personally, and professionally through co-curricular programs, services, and spaces where students:

- Experience a sense of belonging.
- Prioritize self-care, community health, and well-being.
- Explore their identities and those of others.
- Obtain and utilize transferrable and lifelong skills.

Student Affairs is focusing on a culture of care for our students and the staff within Student Affairs who support our students. With the focus on care, we are aligning with UNCSA Forward focusing on health and wellness.

Student Conduct

After having multi-year lows in drug and alcohol cases, we have seen an increase in these cases as we approach the end of the academic term. The majority of staff time has been dedicated to adjudicating the Title IX cases and preparing the appeal for one of these cases.

Nick Gawlik attended the Association for Student Conduct Administration (ASCA) conference in Portland, WA in January 2023 and will be implementing some new best-practices in the near future.

Significant Accomplishments

- Resolving cases in a timely manner with an increase in litigious students.
- Established several new community service partnerships for students to complete their conduct outcomes.
- Piloted new online alcohol education course platform for low-risk, low-level alcohol policy infractions and is free to students. Students who have gone through the course have seen a 0% recidivism rate since Fall 2022.

New Initiatives

- Re-establishing a standing, elected student conduct committee with faculty council to boost case resolution hearing board pool membership.
- Evaluating different case resolution models within UNC system for Title IX infractions in anticipation of new guidance scheduled to be released by the DOE in May 2023.
- Conducting an audit of all hearing charges existing in Maxient (conduct and case management software) to ensure consistency in language with the UNCSA handbook.

Health and Wellness

Health and wellness continue to be a strategic focus of Student Affairs.

- Fitness Center has been working to address proactive approaches to health and wellness this year. Popular offerings this year have been preparation for the Mistletoe 5K and half marathon, group fitness instruction, Sunday night basketball games in the gym and personal training sessions. The usage at the center has increased 40% from last academic year.
- Student Assistance and Support (Case Management) has received over 250 referrals this academic year through student concern reports. These reports represent over 1000 student appointments in the office that is staffed by one full-time employee. Most of the referrals have been for students needing additional mental health support. With additional funding from the UNC System Office Student Assistance and Support will add one full-time staff member to help support these efforts next academic year.

- Wellness Center (Health and Counseling Services) continue to be highly utilized areas. The Counseling Center staff have supported students through over 1500 sessions this academic year, despite being short a full-time counselor in the fall and spring semester. We are currently in the process of searching for a High School Wellness Counselor and Senior Mental Health. Counselor and both will be in place for next academic year.
- Following the death of our student in March we partnered with Wake Forest
 Atrium Health Care to provide additional assistance to students, faculty and staff on
 campus through their First Responder Chaplaincy Program. We co-led four groups
 with their assistance after our campus returned from spring break.
- Student Affairs is investigating additional resources to increase access to counseling and psychiatry services for next academic year.

The Office of Admissions continues to work with campus partners to solidify the Fall 2023 total student headcount goal of **1,370** students. Based on projections, achieving this goal requires enrolling **537** new students across all degree levels and conservatories.

- Submitted applications have been trending ahead of Fall 2022 by approximately 10% in total. While not our strongest season of submitted applications, we are moving back towards pre-pandemic numbers.
- Based on the NC Tuition Grant, high school applications are up 27%.

Admitted applicants

An indicator of achieving the Fall 2023 headcount goal is the year-to-date increase of admitted applicants. To date, the number of admitted applicants has **increased by 10%** compared to last year. Conservatory deans and faculty have indicated that the quality of applicants has not decreased and, in most cases, applicants appear better equipped for our audition process.

Strategy – **Increase matriculation rate from admitted applicants-to-enrolled students**Utilizing a multimedia approach, the Office of Admissions has teamed up with campus partners and outlined a communication plan that incorporates carefully timed and produced messages that encourage matriculation.
