CONVENE MEETING AND CONFIRM QUORUM

Greer Cawood convened the February 8, 2018 Academic and Student Affairs Committee Meeting at 1:01 p.m. A quorum was confirmed.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Greer Cawood asked the committee members to review the minutes from the December 7, 2017 meeting. She then called for a motion to approve the minutes as presented.

MOTION: Michael Tiemann moved to approve the minutes from the December 7, 2017 meeting. Anna Folwell seconded and the minutes were unanimously approved.

PROVOST'S REPORT

Provost English gave the committee updates on two competitive grants that were awarded to the school from the System Office. The first grant is \$29,800 for Behavioral Health and Wellness at UNCSA. The grant funds will be used to start a 4 year partnership with JED Campus, a nationwide initiative to provide schools with customized support for student mental health, substance abuse and suicide prevention efforts. The second award is \$61,500 to support and expand ongoing student success efforts. The influx of \$91,300 in funding will do a great deal to impact these important initiatives.

STUDENT AFFAIRS AND ENROLLMENT MANAGEMENT REPORT

Vice Provost Ward Caldwell gave an update on Student Affairs. \$31,117 in Career Development grants have been awarded to students for projects that will take place over the summer. 391 students are slated to graduate in May. This is UNCSA's largest graduating class ever. Leadership within Residence Life is offering a workshop for staff called "Impacting Your Workplace with Positive Damage; Using Positive Psychology to Rethink, Reframe, and Rebuild Your Professional Space" as part of the Fostering Quality Workplace initiative in the strategic plan.

As of February 3rd, we had 580 more applications than this same time last year for a 28.91% increase year over year. The schools have already admitted 105 students, compared to 56 last year and 45 of those admitted students have made deposits to UNCSA compared to 28 the year before, a 60.71% increase year over year.

STUDENT BODY PRESIDENT REPORT

Hassiem Muhammad reported that the SGA and University administrators are working to place student representatives on committees on campus to make sure that students are represented. The SGA and student organizations are working with the administration to offer forums in the coming weeks for students, faculty and staff about inclusivity on campus.

ACADEMIC AFFAIRS REPORT

Vice Provost Karen Beres reported on ongoing Student Success initiatives. Using a five-year rolling average, there was a 22% decrease in student attrition due to higher transfers, returning students and new enrollees in the spring, as well as better support for our current students. The average GPA of the cohort that went through Student Advantage Week last fall is 3.4. The graduate student coaches have expanded their efforts to include additional students for the spring semester.

SCHOOL OF MUSIC STRATEGIC INITIATIVE UPDATE

Dean Brian Cole gave a presentation on the School of Music Strategic Initiative. The Music dean and faculty developed a vision statement, goals and three main initiatives to preserve the conservatory model while incorporating innovation, service, social action and entrepreneurship into the curriculum. Their first goal is to expand the Community Music School and incorporate it fully into the School of Music.

MOTION TO MOVE TO CLOSED SESSION

Greer Cawood called for a motion to move to closed session.

MOTION: Michael Tiemann motioned to move to closed session. Anna Folwell seconded and the committee unanimously approved.

Enrollment Management Update

Summary: Up to date application statistics and an overview of admitted student numbers for the Fall 2018 recruitment season will be presented at the meeting. In the Board Book you will find the *Current Application Statistics* and an overview of the *Admitted Status* as of April 5, 2018. From the *Current Application Statistics*, as of 4/5/18 we had 2782 applications which represents 614 more than this same time last year for a 28.32% increase year over year. When we look at a three-year average comparison, that increase is 36.37%.

The second attached sheet (*Admitted Status*) provides an overview of the five arts schools and the status of the students the schools have accepted, thus far, for Fall 2018. As of 4/5/18 we have admitted 568 students, compared to 457 last year. Of those admitted students, 197 have made deposits to UNCSA compared to 123 the previous year, a 60.16% increase year over year.

QEP Update - Tell Your Story!

- This year we increased our pool of faculty pilot testers to 23. They have been experimenting with the learning outcomes and assessment rubrics in their classes.
- Five training videos have been produced and links to the Canvas course where they are embedded has been sent out to all the faculty who will be participating.
- We are developing some training sessions for the Fall 2018 Faculty Enrichment Day.
- We are on track to begin our first year of full-implementation in Fall 2018, according to schedule.

Student Success Initiatives 2017-18

Student Advantage Week (SAW)

- 11 students completed the SAW program in August 2017
- 1 has left UNCSA
- Of the 10 who remain:
 - All are making strong progress toward their degree, with an average GPA of 3.50
 - Only one received an Academic Early Warning alert in the spring semester, following two alerts in the fall semester
 - o All are maintaining strong ties with each other
 - Two students have been accepted into the 2018 Welcome Squad; one is a Drama major, as the first Drama representative on the Welcome Squad in recent years
 - One student has been hired as a Resident Assistant on the Residence Life staff
- As a point of reference, UNCSA's logistic regression analysis shows that a student's High School GPA makes a big difference in 1-year retention, with those earning a GPA below 3.0 being retained at 79%, compared to the cohort earning a 3.0 or higher with a retention rate of 86%.
- Our 11-member SAW group is currently demonstrating a retention rate of 90.9%

Graduate Student Coaches

• 29 undergraduate students were referred into the Graduate Student Coach program during the 2017-18 year, including our group of 11 SAW students

- Our five 2017-18 Graduate Student Coaches have engaged in the following communications with their assigned students over the course of the year:
 - o Emails 173
 - o Texts 702
 - o In-person meetings 158
- I am currently conducting an interview process for next year's group of five coaches, based on faculty recommendations of 22 current Design and Production, Film, and Music graduate students.
- The interview process includes first-round written questions/answers via email, followed by invitations for in-person interviews for 8-10 individuals.

Academic Early Warning Report

- 103 undergraduate students have been issued at least one Academic Early Warning report during the 2017-18 year, with each one receiving a follow-up inquiry from our Case Manager.
- Arts School Associate/Assistant Deans were copied on all reports issued for students in their school in order to facilitate follow-up with the student.
- 15 students were connected to the Office of Learning Resources through Academic Early Warning Reports; 25 others either did not respond to the Director reaching out via email or did not follow through on an appointment,
