Shared Governance and Campus Safety

Collaborative Scheduling Initiative

- 1. Faculty Council CSI Subcommittee on the Collaborative Scheduling Initiative meetings were held in December. A wide range of topics were discussed. A discussion of the campus values provided a basis for discussion about how we can go about using the schedule to address Health and Wellness, as well as Workload issues.

Academic Affairs Report......Karen Beres

Summary: The Vice Provost and Dean of Academic Affairs will update the committee on the following topics:

Overview

O UNCSA exceeded our overall goal to raise 4-year and 5-year graduation rates, surpassing goals by 7% for the 4-year rate to 77.3%, and 8% for the 5-year rate to 79.1%. Substantial progress was made in the targeted subgroups of Dance and Music, while opportunity areas for future growth have been identified. No initial programs were eliminated; instead, additional layers of support have been instituted, from expanded mental health resources to academic student success coaching and deeper scholarship funding. Moving forward, utilizing a more precise instrument to capture withdrawal data will allow for the creation of targeted interventions that will bolster continued progress.

School of Dance

- UNCSA exceeded our goal to increase the School of Dance graduation rate to 65% with our 2017 cohort, at a final rate of 67.9%.
- In addition, it is important to note that while our 2017 cohort matched our baseline number of 19 degrees earned, previous and subsequent graduating years met and exceeded our goal of 22. In fact, our 2018 Dance cohort achieved a record 38 degrees earned, demonstrating the efficacy of our improved enrollment and retention efforts.

School of Music

The School of Music has made marked progress toward its articulated graduation goals. In count of degrees awarded, the initial benchmark of 14 degrees was exceeded each year of the plan and a high of 18 degrees was achieved for the class of 2016. At the final 4-year point in 2021, Music fell

- short of the goal of 17 but achieved an increase of one graduate above the initial count.
- In terms of increasing the School of Music's 4-year graduation rate from 51.6% to 65%, we were able to accomplish an 8.2% improvement. With this improvement, Music progressed over halfway to their goal, rising to a graduation rate of 60%.
- The School of Music faces the stiffest competition in student recruitment due to the sheer number of collegiate music schools vying for the most talented students and the deep scholarship resources of many of our competitors. Successful continuity plans for pandemic years allowed for progress to continue to be made, albeit during very challenging times. Music retention and graduation numbers continue to be an opportunity area for UNCSA, with bolstered scholarship resources and academic student success coaching as areas of attention and exploration.

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SCHOOL OF THE ARTS

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Student Affairs Report.....Laurel Donley

Summary: The Assistant Dean – Student Development, Director High School Life will report on the following topics:

The Division of Student Affairs facilitates the artistic, relational, emotional and personal development of students through co-curricular programs, services, and spaces where students:

- Experience a sense of belonging.
- Prioritize self-care, community health, and well-being.
- Explore their own and others' identities
- Obtain and utilize transferrable life skills.

Student Affairs is focusing on a culture of care for our students and the staff within Student Affairs who support our students. We are aligning with the institution's new strategic plan, UNCSA Forward, with a focus on care.

a. Health and Wellness

Student Affairs continues to examine ways we can impact the student experience, especially through co-curricular opportunities and partnerships.

For the university's upcoming Wellness Day (February 17), Student Affairs is partnering with faculty from the Division of Liberal Arts and the School of Music to sponsor the following wellness activities for students:

- Salem Lake Walking Trip with Division of Liberal Arts faculty members Joe Mills and Mike Wakeford
- Guided Bird Watching Walk at Salem Lake with Music Faculty member, Allison Gagnon
- Kour Mindful Meditation with Division of Liberal Arts faculty. Katherine Wiley
- Outdoor games, music and food

Additional collaborations include our teams working with Academic Affairs and the Kenan Institute to host a Faculty Wellness Institute over the summer. The institute will focus on ways to support the development and implementation of a wellness framework in the academic and arts environments.

b. New Student Orientation

The onboarding of new UNCSA students during the new student orientation process is the focus of the institutional partnership between Admission, Student Affairs, the Office of the Provost, Financial Aid, Registrar, Strategic Communications, UNCSA's five art schools, High School Academics, the Division of Liberal Arts, and Campus Services.

Goals for these partnerships include:

• Improving collaboration and coordination between orientation stakeholders

- Improving the effectiveness of UNCSA's student onboarding process
- Improving the efficiency of the move-in and orientation processes

The changes that will occur for new student orientation this year include:

- Launch of a new student mobile app, PATHIFY This provides a one-stop portal where students and their families can more easily find and complete mandatory checklists prior to arriving at UNCSA this fall.
- Expansion of the new student orientation leader role These students will assist firstyear college students throughout the fall semester by serving as a consistent and familiar connection for new students as they assimilate into UNCSA.
- A new virtual orientation for students (July 17-21) Allowing students and their families a less stressful move-in and hectic first day on campus.
- Returning to a one-day move-in experience (August 15) for new college students and their families This eases the stress placed on families by feeling the need to remain on campus for multiple days.

The final phase of this plan will be implemented during next year's (fall 2024) new student orientation which will include a more eco-friendly marketing plan for incoming students featuring a conceptual artist guide.

c. High School Life

The additional funding from the state is providing high school life with the much-needed resources to increase the number of live-in professional and administrative staff resulting in additional support for our high school students.

New positions include:

- Two (2) Community Coordinators (live-in professional staff)
- Wellness Counselor
- Administrative Support Specialist
- EDIB (Equity Diversity Inclusion Belonging) Coordinator

In addition to increasing the number of staff, Student Affairs has engaged with an outside consultant, Jackie O'Rourke with Outermost Education. The scope of Ms. O'Rourke's engagement with us:

- Assess the current student life program in high school while identifying pain points and concerns, as well as the strengths of this unique program.
- A revised student handbook featuring boarding school best practices with a focus on greater clarity and forwarding-thinking communication between Student Affairs and our high school students and their families.
- Leading conversations within the university regarding staffing best practices with a focus
 on work-life balance amidst the particular challenges faced by a high school program on
 a university campus.

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Enrollment Update......Paul C. Razza

The Office of Admissions continues recruitment efforts and cross-campus collaboration to secure the **Fall 2023 total headcount goal of 1,370** students across all degree levels and conservatories. Based on projections, achieving this goal requires bringing in **555 new/incoming students** across all degree levels and conservatories.

National challenges continue to threaten college enrollment throughout public and private universities. According to the National Student Clearinghouse, Fall Term 2022 college enrollment declined by 1.1% compared to Fall Term 2021 enrollment. While the rate of decline has decreased to that of pre-pandemic levels, **national data indicates that since 2019 college enrollment has fallen 7.5%**.

Fall 2023 submitted applications year-to-date comparisons as of 2/2/2023

Submitted applications for UNCSA are shifting back towards pre-pandemic proportions, with an **overall increase of 14%** compared to this time last year. Recruitment travel, additional funding for marketing, an expanded campus tour schedule and participation in programs such as the NC Countdown to College have all proven to boost submitted applications. Below illustrates how each degree level and conservatory are faring compared to year-to-date submitted application activity.

Current Goal: Additional F'23 submitted apps for *programs in need*

While overall submitted applications are trending higher than last year and in some cases higher than the past four years, there are still degree levels and concentrations in need of additional applicants in order to attain their established headcount goals. Undergraduate and graduate programs in Design & Production and Music, as well as graduate programs in Filmmaking all have an opportunity to continue securing submitted applications through the March 1 application deadline.

With this in mind, the Office of Admissions and Strategic Communications are working on a targeted email, social media and search marketing campaign that promotes the March 1 application deadline. The specific audience of the campaign are those who have started a Fall 2023 application for programs in need but who have not yet submitted that application and prospective students who have filled out an inquiry form indicating Fall 2023 interest in those programs but who have not applied. Based on contact information shared and housed in our CRM system, UNCSA can broadcast a focused marketing message to these prospective students not only via email but while they engage in social media and when they are conducting web searches. In total, just over 3,000 prospective applicants currently fall into this category. We expect this marketing action will enable those programs in need to reach their headcount goals.

Posse Arts Scholars:

In our second season with The Posse Foundation, UNCSA collaborated in the recruitment, nomination, and scholarship awarding of our next cohort. As the scholar program continues to grow, our partnership with The Posse Foundation during this second season proved to make great progress in finding right fit emerging artist leaders for UNCSA. While our inaugural 2022 cohort consists of six talented students, **the Fall 2023 cohort will bring in a brilliant nine students to UNCSA**. We expect this partnership to continue to thrive and reach many gifted student leaders. UNCSA is pleased to welcome our next group of Posse Arts Scholars:
