PERFORMANCE NOTES

British playwright Caryl Churchill published "Top Girls," an iconic piece of feminist theater, in 1982, with its premiere coming later that year at the Royal Court Theatre in London. It premiered on Broadway in 2008.

Fourth-Year Drama Directing major Abigail Holland directs this provocative play as her thesis, putting into practice all she has learned at UNCSA School of Drama. Holland's focus in her course of study has been on how women navigate power. Central to her interests are "the interpersonal and institutionalized power dynamics that affect women and how these fit into a patriarchal society," the director says. And "Top Girls" is the perfect vehicle for exploring these interests.

Churchill explores how her characters do and don't take on patriarchal traits to survive. The double- and triple-casting highlights the women of the first act and how their lives mirror the women of the second and third acts. Costumes echo this structural device. All in all, there's plenty here to chew on.

Given the current political and social environment, "Top Girls" feels like a timely offering at the School of Drama.

Abigail and the cast have dedicated the process to Josh Foldy and his devotion to joy.

ABOUT THE PLAYWRIGHT

Caryl Churchill was born on September 3, 1938, in London and grew up in the Lake District and in Montreal, Canada. She was educated at Lady Margaret Hall, Oxford. "Downstairs," her first play written while she was still at university, was first staged in 1958 and won an award at the Sunday Times National Union of Students Drama Festival. Churchill's plays include: "Owners," "Traps," "Light Shining in Buckinghamshire," "Cloud 9," "Top Girls," "Fen," "Serious Money," "Ice Cream," "Mad Forest," "The Skriker," "Blue Heart," "This is a Chair," "Far Away," "A Number," "Drunk Enough To Say I Love You?," "Seven Jewish Children," "Love & Information," "Here We Go" and "Escaped Alone." Music theatre includes "Lives of the Great Poisoners" and "Hotel," both with Orlando Gough. Churchill has also written for radio and television.

BIOGRAPHY

Abigail Holland is a fourth-year director in the School of Drama. Her work focuses on odd women navigating odd circumstances. While at school, she's directed "I Wanna Fucking Tear You Apart," "Does This Woman Have a Name?," "This Flight Tonight," and she created an adaption of Edna O'Brien's short story "Long Distance." She created "Fat: Civil Disobedience" with Emma Davis and is currently working on an original piece with Sean Stack. Holland has assistant directed "Luna Gale," "Romeo and Juliet," "Still Life with Rocket" and "Balm in Gilead," as well as produced "Yen," two play festivals and School of Drama's Intensive Arts.
