BIOGRAPHY

MARK A NORMAN is the director of instrumental ensembles at the University of North Carolina School of the Arts (UNCSA). He teaches instrumental conducting, directs the wind ensemble and chamber winds, conducts select performances with the symphony orchestra, and he is the co-director of nu Ensemble whose focus centers on new music. Previously, he has served on the conducting faculties at the University of Michigan, University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, University of North Carolina at Greensboro, Washburn and Towson universities, Ensembles under his direction have performed at international, national and state conferences and in some of the top performing concert halls in the United States. Norman maintains an active schedule as a guest artist, clinician and adjudicator for professional and academic ensembles. workshops and festivals. Recent guest conducting programs include those with the Western Piedmont Symphony, Winston-Salem Symphony, North Carolina Brass Band and the All-State District VII Honors Band in Raleigh, NC.

Norman is a former principal tuba of the Georgetown, McLean and Mt. Vernon symphonies and tuba instrumentalist with the United States Navy Band in Washington, DC. He has also performed with the North Carolina, Charlotte, Richmond, Fairfax, Winston-Salem, Greensboro and Topeka symphony orchestras and is the winner of several solo and chamber music competitions. Outside of his duties at UNCSA, he is the music director of the American Music Ensemble, a professional consort comprised of UNCSA alumni and faculty specializing in the 19th and 20th century music of Scott Joplin, John Phillip Sousa and early jazz composers.
