As a young freelancer, he has performed with the Raleigh Symphony Orchestra. Barclift's parents are band directors and were his first music teachers. Before coming to UNCSA, he studied with Mary Burroughs and Maria Serkin.

LOGAN FISCHER, from Naples, Fla., is an undergraduate senior at UNCSA pursuing a Bachelor of Music in horn performance. Fischer is an active freelance musician performing with the Chamber Orchestra of the Triangle, Raleigh Symphony Orchestra, North Carolina Brass Band, Piedmont Wind Symphony and the Kentucky Symphony Orchestra. At UNCSA, he has enjoyed performing with the graduate woodwind quintet, various chamber ensembles and the orchestra. He has spent summers at the Eastern Music Festival as well as the Philadelphia International Music Festival. Fischer's principal teachers include Maria Serkin and Kirsten Bendixen-Mahoney along with additional studies with Joy Hodges Branagan and Ryan Little. His true love for music lies in the collective experience of chamber ensembles. When not performing he enjoys brewing coffee and studying psychology.

MYLES MOORE is from Charlotte, N.C., and is a first-year graduate horn student at UNCSA. Recently, he was a featured soloist at the North Carolina Choral Directors Association Conference in Raleigh. He enjoys performing with UNCSA's large ensembles and the graduate brass quintet. Prior to coming to UNCSA, he studied music education with a concentration in horn at Winston Salem State University. Moore plans to pursue his doctorate in music performance and teach at the college level. This summer, he plans to study with Christoph Eß at the Landesakademie in Ochsenhausen, Germany.

CAMERON POLLARD is originally from Gastonia, N.C., and is a high school senior at UNCSA. He started his musical journey on the piano before starting the horn in the seventh grade. This summer, he plans to study with Christoph Eß at the Landesakademie in Ochsenhausen, Germany. Pollard was appointed four times to the South-Central District Concert Band. In 2021, he won the principal chair position for the North Carolina All-State Concert Band. While living in Charlotte, he was the principal horn player in the Youth Orchestra of Charlotte. Before attending UNCSA, Pollard studied with Frank Portone, former principal horn of the Charlotte Symphony Orchestra. He aspires to pursue a career as an orchestral horn player.

Exploring diversity has been a trademark of the award-winning duo since its inception in 2015, having carried its mission of bringing underrepresented music to its audiences in Brazil, Mexico and the U.S. as well as creating live concert experiences online. Anima Vox is an innovative flute and soprano duo composed of faculty-artist Tadeu Coelho, flute, and Carole Ott Coelho, soprano.

This concert will feature a world premiere composition for flute, voice and piano by UNCSA high school flute student Phoebe Pylant. Her composition uses text by Sor Juana de la Cruz (1648-95), a 17th-century Mexican nun, self-taught scholar and acclaimed writer who was persecuted for her literary works. The title of the composition is "Hombre Necios (Foolish Men)."

UNCSA Wind Ensemble in Concert: Of Our New Day Begun Thursday, April 7, 2022 • 7:30 p.m. Stevens Center

UNCSA presents the premieres of newly commissioned arrangements of marches and cotillions for concert band by Francis "Frank" Johnson, one of the most respected and sought-after bandleaders in New England in the early 19th century.

Johnson wrote over 200 works and was a pioneer for musicians in the young nation of his time. He was the first published African American composer in the U.S. and the first to integrate a music ensemble. In 1937, his band was the first to travel to Buckingham Palace via invitation from Queen Victoria, who presented him with a silver bugle in appreciation.
