BIOGRAPHIES

MARK A. NORMAN

Mark A. Norman has enjoyed a career spanning over thirty-five years as a conductor and tuba performer. He is the music director/conductor of the Piedmont Wind Symphony and the director of instrumental ensembles at University of North Carolina School of the Arts (UNCSA). During his tenure with the Piedmont Wind Symphony, Norman has conducted the professional ensemble in critically acclaimed performances. He has also led the group in producing recordings, including new works by Brian Balmages, John Mackey and Randall Standridge.

At UNCSA, Norman is a member of the faculty-artist of the School of Music, conducting the Wind Ensemble, the Chamber Winds and the Bergstone Brass. He also serves as the resident conductor of the UNCSA Orchestra. Norman teaches courses in conducting and music entrepreneurship, and he leads the graduate conducting program at UNCSA. In 2022, Norman developed and orchestrated a live soundtrack for the play "Amadeus," and he served as the production's music director, leading twenty costumed, on-stage musicians. Norman has previously served on the conducting faculties at the University of Michigan, University of North Carolina Greensboro, University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, Washburn University and Towson University. He is a former member of several orchestras and was a tuba instrumentalist with the US Navy Band in Washington, D.C. He resides in Pfafftown, North Carolina with his wife Amanda and their two dogs, Miles and Marley, and their cat, Max.

HANNAH MUFUKA

Originally from Atlanta, Georgia, Hannah Mufuka creates both concert music and music for the screen. Currently majoring in music composition at UNCSA, she is on track to earn her Bachelor of Music in 2025. As a concert composer, Mufuka takes inspiration primarily from fantasy scores, jazz, minimalism and folk music. She has performed with and composed for various wind ensembles, jazz combos, orchestras and other groups, which expanded her love for different types of music.

As a film composer, Mufuka has taken on numerous projects across various genres, from horror to comedy to drama. Her ultimate goal is to create art that brings people joy, expressed through various artistic mediums. Alongside her creative pursuits, Mufuka has a history of volunteering and advocating for the arts, demonstrating her dedication to music and community involvement in every endeavor.

PHYLLIS PANCELLA

Currently serving on the voice faculty at UNCSA, award-winning mezzo-soprano Phyllis Pancella is a veteran of international opera and concert stages, in music extending from the baroque to six months ago. Her opera roles have ranged from Carmen and Adalgisa to Lizzie Borden and Nero, with major companies including Houston, Chicago, San Francisco, London, Paris, Tel Aviv and Naples. In concert repertoire, she has performed under the batons of Leonard Slatkin, Jane Glover, Daniel Barenboim, James Conlon and Anne Manson, among many others.

BIOGRAPHIES

A highly regarded interpreter of chamber music and art song, Pancella has appeared with Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center, Chamber Music Northwest, New World Symphony, Orchestra della Toscana and the Prague New Music Festival. Her work with contemporary composers has resulted in many premieres, including Dominick Argento's "Miss Manners on Music," and she appears on recordings with the Naxos, Erato, Neos and Navona labels, as well as with UNCSA's new media label. A dedicated advocate for student artists, Pancella has been a guest faculty member at Indiana University, Boston Conservatory and Florida State University, and she has served on the faculty of the Janiec Opera Company at the Brevard Music Festival.

ROBERT YOUNG

Robert Young won a 2017 Grammy© Award for his performance with the PRISM Quartet on the album "Gavin Bryars: The Fifth Century" (available on ECM Recordings). He has collaborated and performed with many celebrated artists and ensembles throughout his career. Highlights include performances with the PRISM Quartet, The Crossing, Chris Potter, Ravi Coltrane, Uri Caine and the Detroit Chamber Winds and Strings. As an active soloist, Young has been acclaimed for his "effortless expression and a facile technique" and his "true mastery of his instrument" (The Saxophonist Magazine).

Young has appeared in residence as a guest at several institutions across the United States; including The University of North Texas, University of Michigan, University of Missouri-Kansas City, University of Massachusetts-Amherst and Pennsylvania State University. In the summer of 2018, he was invited as a featured concerto soloist in Zagreb, Croatia, at the XVIII World Saxophone Congress. Prior to his appointment at UNCSA in 2016, he held teaching professorships at the Crane School of Music (SUNY-Potsdam) and Wichita State University.

"Eternal peace, grant unto them, O Lord, and let the perpetual light shine upon them." With those words, Duruflé's incandescent Mass for the Dead begins. Not a rafter-shaking Requiem, but one whose music speaks of consolation and acceptance: "...the ultimate answer of Faith to all the questions by the flight of the soul to Paradise," according to the composer. Led by James Allbritten, the UNCSA Cantata Singers, UNCSA Symphony Orchestra, and organist Timothy Olsen perform this fervent work of the late 1940s with its echoes of Gregorian chant, Ravel and Debussy. They will also be joined by choirs from Wake Forest University led by Director of Choral Activities Chris Gilliam.
